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Statutory Definition of Domestic Abuse: Domestic Abuse Act 2021

Domestic abuse covers a wide range of behaviours that are used to control, threaten or intimidate victims. Behaviours are classed as domestic abuse if:

- Both the individuals are over 16 years of age
- Both the individuals are 'personally connected' to each other and the behaviour is abusive

Behaviour is considered abusive if it consists of one or more of the following:

- Physical or sexual abuse psychological or emotional abuse
- **Coercive or Controlling behaviour** –intimidation, threats, humiliation that is used to punish, harm, isolate a victim and prevent them from enjoying life
- Economic abuse any behaviour that prevents a victim having the ability to acquire, use or maintain money, or obtain goods or services

Statutory Definition of Domestic Abuse: Domestic Abuse Act 2021 - Children & Young People

The definition now also recognises Children and Young People as victims in their own right:

- Any reference in the Act to a victim of DA includes CYP (U18) who:
- a) Sees or hears or experiences the effects of abuse
- and
- b) Is related to A or B

A child is related if:

- a) is a parent of or have PR for the child
- or
- b) the child and the persons are related

Context

Domestic Abuse ruins or takes lives:

one woman in four will experience domestic abuse at some point in her life in England and Wales 2 women are killed every week.

Modern technology gives perpetrators ever-growing ways to stalk, isolate and control victims using the tools of everyday life.

There was a 97% increase in tech abuse between April 2020 & March 2021 reported to the Refuge Charity

- 1 in 6 men are affected by domestic abuse at some point in their life in England and Wales.
- Around 30 men are murdered each year.
- 1 in 3 women will experience online abuse at some point in their lives
- Women are 7 x more likely to experience sexual harassment and stalking than men.

What is tech abuse?

Anything technological that can be used to abuse, control and intimidate a victim

If you have a feeling something isn't right...

- Tech abuse is real. Abusers may use technology to control, harass or intimidate.
- They may carry out physical, sexual, psychological, or economic abuse using technology.
- For example,
 - they may hack mobile phone
 - cyberstalk, or
 - use social media, cameras, or other kinds of technology to try to harm or control the victim and their children

• You have the right to be safe and respected online and in real life.

Recognising tech abuse

✓ Could someone be using technology to harm or control you?

- ✓ Is someone stalking you online or watching everything you do?
- ✓ Is someone harassing you by sending constant messages that upset you?
- ✓ Is someone posting about you online or threatening to share images?
- ✓ Do you feel pressured to share your messages or phone?
- ✓ Is someone controlling or limiting use of your phone? Has someone hacked your phone?
- ✓ Does someone have access to your online accounts and passwords?
- ✓ Is someone trying to get to you through your children's phone or games?
- ✓ Are you being cyberstalked?

Signs someone may be experiencing tech abuse

- ✓ Abuser constantly sends messages or calls?
- ✓ Phone or email has been hacked?
- ✓ Being Cyberstalked
- ✓ Partner or ex-partner checking up all the time?
- ✓ Is someone posting online or threatening to share images?
- ✓ partner or ex-partner show up wherever the victim might be?
- ✓ Is the abuser controlling tech?
- ✓ Ex-partner using the children to get access to the victim?
- ✓ needing to change what behaviour or plans to keep someone calm?
- ✓ The abuser has access to online banking or benefits?
- ✓ Using smart home devices against you?

A stalker used an Amazon Alexa to listen in on his ex-partner before threatening to stab her friend and throw acid in her face, a court heard.

Hassan Mehmet, 35, waged a campaign of harassment against Shelby Laidlaw, who he had been in a relationship with for 13 years before they split in April.

He went on to show her a knife, threatening to stab her male friend, before convincing the terrified woman to lend him her Jaguar, which he then deliberately drove off the M20, the court was told.

MPs have sounded the alert after a Scots sex offender became the first person in the UK to be convicted of using an Amazon Alexa device to snoop on his victim.

The landmark case emerged as a Westminster select committee is holding an inquiry into the growing use - and possible abuse - of smart technology.
