Safer Sleep for babies away from home or in emergency situations.
Routine is important in reducing the risk of Sudden Infant Deaths (SIDS); therefore it's advised that parents keep the same sleeping routine for baby and always putting them to sleep on their back for every day and night time sleep. It focuses on a woman with a chronic alcohol problem and a pattern of head injuries and shows how that can make it much harder for her to move forward. <u>Safe care at home review</u> is a published joint review led by the Home Office and DHSC into the protections and support for adults abused, or at risk of abuse, in their own home by people providing their care.

During the passage of the Domestic Abuse Act 2021, evidence was presented on violence against people receiving care in their own homes, inviting the government to consider whether care relationships should be explicitly covered by the Domestic Abuse Act 2021.

The review makes the case that a stronger response is needed to protect and support people with care and support needs who are at risk of, or experiencing, abuse in their own homes by people providing their care. <u>Download the full report here.</u>



UK businesses to get free Government tool to tackle economic abuse: UK businesses and charities are to be provided with a free interactive guide to help their staff spot and tackle economic abuse when speaking to customers over the phone. "The guide, which will be available widely later this year, has already been released to 30,000 HMRC staff to help them spot the signs and create an appropriate environment for victims to disclose their experiences.
