Learning from Reviews

- Exploitation has been a theme in reviews for both children and adults.
- SAR Alison <u>A thematic review of financial exploitation/coercion from SAR Alison (authored by Nicola</u> <u>Sawyer) - Swindon Safeguarding Partnership</u>
- Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel in 2020 published <u>'It was hard to escape'</u> focusing on safeguarding children at risk from criminal exploitation. The themes highlighted are equally applicable to all forms of exploitation of children and adults.

Some key themes included:

- Building trusted relationships to bring open and honest conversations
- Critical moments capacity and responsiveness to respond at critical moments.
- Helping parents/carers and extended families to manage risk
- Acknowledging & managing risk
- Disrupting perpetrators
- National Referral Mechanism misunderstood and not consistently used

Supporting children at risk of, or experiencing, harm outside the home

Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023 section 194 states...

Some children experience abuse and exploitation outside the home. This is often referred to as "extra-familial harm". Harm can occur in a range of extra-familial contexts, including school and other educational settings, peer groups, or within community/public spaces, and/or online. Children may experience this type of harm from other children and/or from adults. Forms of extra-familial harm include exploitation by criminal and organised crime groups and individuals (such as county lines and financial exploitation), serious violence, modern slavery and trafficking, online harm, sexual exploitation, teenage relationship abuse, and the influences of extremism which could lead to radicalisation.



Children of all ages can experience extra-familial harm.



Safeguarding Adults

- Section 42 Care Act 2014 Enquiry by local authority
- (1)This section applies where a local authority has reasonable cause to suspect that an adult in its area (whether or not ordinarily resident there)—
- (a)has needs for care and support (whether or not the authority is meeting any of those needs),
- (b)is experiencing, or is at risk of, abuse or neglect, and (c)as a result of those needs is unable to protect himself or herself against the abuse or neglect or the risk of it.

If you have concerns - Adult

If you are concerned an adult may be at risk or is experiencing abuse and neglect, you can make a referral in the following ways.

Police out-of-hours contact: To report a crime or raise a concern about abuse with Wiltshire Police, you can phone the non-emergency number on 101. If someone is in immediate danger you should always dial 999.

What is Exploitation?

Exploitation is a form of abuse where someone is forced or coerced into doing things for the benefit of others.

- Exploitation is often a gradual process
- People are groomed and introduced to new ideas, behaviours and activities, making these appear normal and acceptable
- These behaviours and activities may seem exciting or give someone something they are looking for – including money, gifts or a sense of belonging
- > People may not recognise that they are being exploited until their situation becomes very serious
- Exploitation can take many forms, can take place in a range of situations, and can involve many groups of people
- Exploitation is a hidden and complex crime which abuses the basic human rights and dignity of victims who are subject to it

What does Exploitation look like?

Exploitation may be taking place even if someone seems to be making their own choices or the activity they are taking part in appears consensual.

Exploitation can....

- Affect any child, young person or adult, regardless of age, ethnicity, nationality, gender identity and sexuality.
- ➢ be carried out by individuals or groups.
- > involve force, control, coercion and intimidation.
- > involve people being forced to take part in the exploitation of others.
- > involve people being forced to take part in criminal activity.
- ➢ involve control and coercion this could be psychological or physical.

When a person builds a relationship with a child, young person or an adult at risk so they can abuse them and manipulate them into doing things.

Abuse is usually sexual or financial, but it can also include other illegal acts.

This may take place online or in person and can happen over a short or long period of time - from days to

years.

Online:

- > via social media networks,
- text messages/messaging apps, email,
- > text, voice and video chats in forums,
 - ➤ games and apps

Groomers are good at lying about who they are, particularly online where they can create a false identity and pretend to be younger than they are.

In person: a groomer can be a stranger or someone the already known or trusted, for example through a friend or family, or at a club they go to.

Coercive and Controlling Behaviour

- Coercive control may start through grooming.
- Predators may target children, or adults, families, friends, professionals. They may initially provide support and assistance as part of the grooming process to win trust.
- Coercive and Controlling Behaviour describes a pattern of behaviour which seeks to take away the victims sense of liberty or freedom.
- This is designed to make a person dependent by isolating them from support, exploiting them, depriving them of independence and regulating their everyday behaviour.

Use of Language

- The way we use language influences our thinking. Reviews in other areas have highlighted this as a significant issue which contributed to systemic failure to protect.
- Any language implying that a child/adult are complicit in or responsible for the harm they experience, negatively influences the lens by which we assess their needs and offer support.
- Victim blaming language may reinforce messages from perpetrators around shame and guilt. This in turn may prevent the person from disclosing their abuse as they may feel fear of being blamed by professionals.
- If we use inappropriate language what the adult and other professionals may hear is that they are in some way responsible for what is happening to them and therefore less deserving of our support.
- Adultification bias happens when preconceptions held about children, lead to them being treated and perceived as being more 'adult-like' (Goff et al, 2014, Davis, J. and Marsh, N., 2020). 

Spot the signs of Radicalisation

- \checkmark Radicalisation can happen both in person or online.
- Everyone is different, and there is no checklist that can tell us if someone is being radicalised or becoming involved in terrorism. But these signs may mean someone is being radicalised:
- ✓ accessing extremist content online or downloading propaganda material
- \checkmark justifying the use of violence to solve societal issues
- \checkmark altering their style of dress or appearance to accord with an extremist group
- \checkmark being unwilling to engage with people who they see as different
- \checkmark using certain symbols associated with terrorist organisations

How might I identify vulnerability to/signs of Radicalisation?

Key Points:

- There isn't a single profile of radicalisation.
- It is unlikely to be just one factor but a combination, understanding context is part of the Channel process in assessing level of risk.
- Radicalisation can occur regardless of age, gender, lifestyle, beliefs or religion.



Possession of extreme materials or symbols e.g. swastikas	'Them' and 'Us' thinking
Change in language to include racist, offensive words	Isolation from family / friendship group
Talking about / planning violent action	Watching, sharing, or creating films online linked to religious, political, or racial hate
Feelings of grievance or injustice	Being at a transitional time of life or personal crisis
Need for identity, status or a sense of belonging	Family or friends holding or being involved with extremist ideas
Desire for political, social or moral change	Being influenced or controlled by a group

National Referral Mechanism

- The National Referral Mechanism (NRM) is a framework for identifying and referring potential victims of modern slavery and ensuring they receive the appropriate support.
- **Children:** If the potential victim is under 18, or may be under 18, an NRM referral must be made. Child victims do not have to consent to be referred into the NRM and must first be safeguarded and then referred into the NRM process.
- Adults: Consent is required for an adult to be referred to the NRM. This is informed consent and you must explain: what the NRM is, what support is available through it, what the possible outcomes are for an individual being referred

We have a youth service called Fearless which provides an anonymous reporting option for young people, but also educates them on crime and the signs to look out for. We have free resources for professionals working with young people at <u>www.fearless.org</u>.




