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


Defining public health

A lifecourse approach to understanding vulnerability




Why is Violence and Exploitation a PH Issue?

 Long been recognised as a significant concern for public health because of the ill-health and suffering that it causes.

 Violence has sometimes been compared to a disease – a complex preventable problem that can be understood and addressed by using some of the techniques more usually applied to disease control.

- Define the scale of the problem and measuring the impacts of exploitation on our communities

- Tackle complex and multiple vulnerabilities at scale, through a partnership of equals to establish prevention models and advocating for effective intervention at all stages
